Methodological recommendations.

Evaluation tools for the current monitoring of progress are the first and final certifications. Written certifications are conducted in the form of answers to two questions posed by the teacher, or in the form of a test (at the discretion of the teacher). The first certification is carried out in order to check the students' mastering of the course material, recommended by the teacher of literature, their ability to successfully analyze and understand the material offered to their attention, as well as to apply the acquired knowledge in practice. Therefore, in the that certification can be included as questions that check the proper independent work of the student, that is, the degree of familiarity and understanding of the texts of students, the basic concepts of the theory and history of ethics and professional ethics, and more free, creative tasks designed to identify and develop the analytical abilities of the student. Questions on the final work reflect all the material of the course, including the independent work of the student.
