It will also equip them with skills to report effectively in demonstrating an understanding of how the international news agenda is constructed and should be circulated by respecting and appreciating diversity in culture, society, and point of view regardless of geographical location.

- 2. To help students develop effective communication in mass media and intercultural contexts by exploring the functions and impact of global communication
- 3. To expose students to a variety of global issues including diversity of news and mass communications, emerging trends in global business communication and media, and advances in technology
