1. COURSE GOAL (s)

The aim of the course "International Protection of Human Rights" is to teach basic terminology and categories which are used in the international human rights law. The main objective is to familiarize students with the key issues in the field of international protection of human r as basic human rights treaties, establishment and development of basic principles and norms of international human rights law, activities of the human rights promotion and protection mechanisms on the universal and regional level, giving special attention to the status and powers of the human rights treaty bodies, main and subsidiary bodies of the United Nations as examples of the former, and regional instruments and mechanisms within Council of Europe (CoE), European Union (EU), Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE), Organization of American States (OAS), African Union (AU), League of Arab States (LAS), etc. The aim of the course is also to teach students to assess different suggestions on the improving the functioning of the UN human rights machinery, as well as to develop skills of unassisted analysis of international treaties and practical application of the knowledge received.
