1. COURSE GOAL

The discipline “Political science” is included in the specialty program “Veterinary science” in the direction of 36.05.01 “Veterinary Medicine” and is studied in the 1st semester of the 1st year. The discipline is implemented by the Department of Public Policy and History of State and Law. The discipline consists of 8 sections and 11 topics and is aimed at studying the main political institutions and the features of their functioning.

The purpose of mastering the discipline is to introduce students to the basics of political science and to form in them a general understanding of politics, its main aspects, problems, patterns and its interaction with other spheres of public life.
