The goal of the discipline "Roman Law" is to introduce the students to the provisions, concepts and constructions of Roman private law, which are transformed into legal concepts of the law of the modern period.

The tasks of the discipline "Roman Law" are:

- to form students' knowledge of the origin and formation of the main civil law (civil law) institutions, concepts and terms;
- to determine the essence of the development and improvement of the institutions of Roman law in historically changing socio-economic conditions;
- to reveal the cognitive and applied significance of the Roman legal categories for modern civil law;
  - to teach students the skills and techniques of legal analysis.
